Cascade Head Biosphere Explorience: Explore Lincoln City launched a new Explorience on May 1. This 90-minute walking tour guides visitors through Oregon's only UNESCO Biosphere Region, providing a 10,000 year snapshot of the natural history of this remarkable place where land meets the sea. Led by a trained naturalist, visitors will learn about the unique flora, fauna and geology of the Biosphere Region, the revolutionary conservation efforts on the Salmon River, and the history of the Nechesne peoples, the first inhabitants of the land. ## **Emergency Preparedness**

May is Wildfire Awareness Month, and the Oregon State Fire Marshal is encouraging all Oregonians to get prepared for the upcoming wildfire season. Creating defensible space is one of the most important things you can do to protect your home and increase the chances it will survive a wildfire. "Creating defensible space might feel overwhelming but taking it one project at a time can go a long way in protecting your home," Oregon State Fire Marshal Mariana Ruiz-Temple said. "May is a great time to tackle these projects before the heat of summer arrives."

A few projects you can consider this month include:

- Space and prune trees.
- Remove leaves, needles, wood, bark mulch, and other debris from within 100 feet of buildings or to the property line.
- Remove leaves, needles, and other debris from roofs and gutters.
- Move flammable material away from the outside of your home, including mulch, flammable plants, leaves, and needles.
- Prevent plants from growing directly under the eaves; a minimum of five feet away is recommended.
- Keep firewood piles and lumber at least 30 feet from any structure.
- Maintain the plants in your yard. Clean out old leaves or pine needles from your plants and prune away dead parts.
